PORT LOCATION

Ships dock at the Kristiansand Cruise Terminal, which is 1km/0.6mile from the city centre (15-min walk)

Getting Around: The easiest way to enjoy Kristiansand is on foot. There is a bus system that links you with major attractions outside of the city centre. A local bus station is nearby the port and a ticket can be purchased in the cruise terminal, on the AKT Billett-app (Apple | Android) or on the bus 📰 💰

KRISTIANSAND HIGHLIGHTS - SELF-GUIDED WALKING TOUR FROM CRUISE PORT

Fiskebrygga Fish Market: Lively and fun fish market set in the quay just outside of the cruise port area. See fishing boats and enjoy fresh seafood in waterfront restaurants.

Kristiansand Cathedral: The largest church in the city, and the longest in the whole country at 70m (230ft) long. Opened in 1885, this Gothic Revival cathedral is part of the Church of Norway. Organ recitals on cruise ship days. 10a-5p (Mon-Fri) | Free | 1.3km from port (20-min walk) | 🚱 | 👚

Posebyn Old Town: In the eastern part of the city is Kristiansand's old town, with charming white wooden houses and quirky shops. After a fire ravaged Kristiansand in 1892, just this area survived. 24 hours | Free | 1.8km from port (25-min walk) | 🌎

Christiansholm Fortress: A military fortress built in 1672, with picnic tables and great views over the water. 24 hours | Free | 1.6km from port (21-min walk) | 🌎

Bystranda City Beach: A popular urban beach, which feels more like being in southern parts of Europe... but the water's certainly not warm. 24 hours | Free | 1.7km from port (23-min walk) | 😚

REGIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

Kristiansand Kanonmuseum: Built as a fortress by the Germans in WWII, this museum has a a large collection of canons, including the second-largest land canon in the world. 11a-3p (Mon-Fri), 11a-6p (Sat, Sun) | €10.40| 10.2km from port (17-min drive) | 🌎 | 👚

Kristiansand Zoo & Amusement Park: Norway's largest zoo and amusement park, Dyrepark is a huge entertainment area comprising of different parks, a zoo, theme parks and a water park.

SOMETHING TO EAT OR DRINK

Seafood: Given its close proximity to the sea, Kristiansand is known for its fresh seafood, such as Sursild (pickled herring). At Fiskebrygga, you can enjoy fresh shrimp and mussels straight off the boat.

Fårikål: Considered by many to be Norway's national dish, this is a hearty stew made with lamb and cabbage.

Lefse: A potato flatbread, often served with fish, meat and cheese.

Brunost: Also known as 'brown cheese', this delicious caramel cheese is made with whey from the making of white cheese, mixed with fresh milk or cream. A delicious sweet cheese typical of the region.

LOCAL SOUVENIRS

Reindeer Pelts: A big part of Norwegian culture and tradition, and an excellent way to stay warm in the winter. They're such good insulation that locals will use them to sit outside in the snow.

Cheese Slicer: If you're taking home some brown cheese, make sure to get a cheese slicer to carve it from the block as the locals do.

Hiking Gear: Norwegians live for the outside and their hiking gear is top quality and well-priced.

Tine: A traditional box, typically used to store cheese. Early examples date back to the 1800s.
